Review Requirements and Issue History

- 4.2 Section 32 of the *Emergency Management Act 2006* requires that this plan is reviewed at least once every 2 years after approval by the Minister for Police and Emergency Management.
- 4.3 This issue (Issue 6) entirely supersedes the previous issue of this plan. Superseded issues should be destroyed, or clearly marked as superseded and removed from general circulation.

Validation of this Plan

- 4.4 Arrangements in this plan are selected on a risk basis and validated (usually following review of the plan) unless arrangements are used for an emergency and the debrief findings show the arrangements were effective.

Consultation for this Issue

- 4.5 The review of this issue of this plan was coordinated by the State Emergency Service. The first consultation draft was prepared with input from the working group consisting of representatives from Local Government Association of Tasmania, Department of Premier and Cabinet, Department of Health and Human Services, State Security Unit and State Emergency Service. The approach to consultation was approved by SEMAG and two rounds of consultation occurred with the Tasmanian emergency management community. This included invitations to comment on the drafts being extended to:
- a. SEMC and SEMAG members
 - b. chairpersons of existing emergency management committees and sub-committees
 - c. regionally based representatives of Commonwealth Government departments
 - d. the Tasmanian community.
