# Preparing for UTAS

## PLOTTING YOUR COURSE

To make a smooth transition to university it is essential to think in terms of you as manager of your learning. A key outcome for any degree is learning how to learn. A second outcome for most students is applying the knowledge and skills they have acquired to a career. Choosing the right course and the right major for you can be informed by examination of your interests, exploration of different options and help from others.

## Interests

Choosing to come to university is seldom a choice made in isolation. It has consequences for family, partners and friends. Support people can play a vital role in helping you to maintain your motivation in study over the time of your degree.

It will help to include these people in your planning, particularly if they have not been involved in tertiary education before. Talking about the nature of university and how it will impact on them can be helpful. Working together to decide when and how you will fit in study can prevent problems later on. ## NEGOTIATING THE SYSTEM

The size of the University and the formality of the application and enrolment process can

make it quite daunting. It’s important to remember that behind all the paper are real people. If you have any questions about your enrolment, or don’t know who to ask, ring the Student Centre on 1300 361 928. If they can’t answer your question, they’ll refer you to someone who can.

## WAITING FOR YOUR OFFER

For students commencing at the beginning of the year – offers for non-quota restricted courses will be mailed progressively from August the year prior to commencement of study and offers for quota restricted places will be mailed progressively from mid-October.

If you apply online, you need to check online to see if you have received an offer. Once you receive and have accepted an offer, you will be given a username and password and will be able to access the eStudentCentre.

Make sure to let the Student Centre know if your address changes (1300 361 928). Remember that offers are made up until the start of the semester.

Often the first response of students visiting the campus is awe at the physical size. The number of buildings, the geography of the campus and the distances to cover can be overwhelming at first. Lecture classes can be more than 300 people! Finding rooms can seem impossible! Car parking can be a nightmare! Studying with a wide variety of age and culture groups may be a vastly new experience. Take time to walk around the campus and find the buildings relevant for you before your classes start.

### Fees

There are a number of costs associated with attending University. An approximate summary of these costs (per year) is provided below:

Text books and stationery	\$400 - \$1000
Accommodation	\$6,000 – \$13,500
Higher Education Contribution Scheme (HECS-HELP)	\$4,355 - \$9,080 *

## TIME MANAGEMENT

"I finally realised that it was not so much about being smart, but being organised." (PhD student).

Juggling study, social, family and often work commitments takes high-level skills that we need to continually revise. Some students forget that their time is their own and they wait for others to organise them. This won't happen at uni. Take the initiative to organise yourself and seek help if you need it.

- Yearly planners and diaries are available through the Tasmania University Union or the Co-op Bookshop on your campus – get one!
- Pick up a Time Management fact sheet and free weekly planner from Support and Equity, or download copies from the web at: [www.support-equity.utas.edu.au](http://www.support-equity.utas.edu.au) (under 'Useful Study Tools').
- Add University key dates to your planner.
- Schedule in lectures, tutorials, work times and other commitments. When you get them, mark all assignments and tests onto your planner.
- Enrol in UniStart to learn more about time management.

## BECOMING PART OF THE UNIVERSITY COMMUNITY

Research repeatedly shows that students who succeed at uni become part of the community. They get to know other students, lecturers and tutors and make use of support services. They take the lead with their learning and use the wide range of resources at university in the way that best suits them. It is important to recognise that university is not just about a 'piece of paper' but a life development process. The faster you can feel part of the place, the easier your time at university will be. There are a few things you can do to help yourself with this process:

- Get used to your campus. Explore, wander around, have a coffee, read noticeboards and chat to people.
- If you have a question: ASK! ASK! ASK!
- Attend all orientation events relevant to you.
- Find out if your school or faculty has a mentor scheme and make use of it.
